## Creature of the Month

reg Harrington and Eddie Long discovered an interesting life form on a recent dive.

Because of its size, they suspected it to be a shark egg of some type. I was a clear, volleyball-sized object with a golfball sized opaque center. Although only sharks and rays lay eggs of any size, this creature turned out to be more closely related to a jellyfish than a shark. I will provide facts on this beauty in a future newsletter. This month's article will be on sharks.

Sharks and rays produce young in several ways (unlike humans, which have numerous and sometimes bizarre methods). Species that bear live young are called viviparous and the ones that produce eggs are included in the ovoviviparous types. Can you believe my spell check didn't highlight either one of these terms!

Most sharks and rays bear live young. There are many interesting facts on this subject. Of note is the fact that unborn sharks will feed on unfertilized eggs and less developed embryos. Talk about sibling rivalry!

There are a few types of sharks that lay eggs. Some can be found in our area. The Horn shark and the Swell shark are two, though Monterey is reported to be the northern limit of their range.

## Horn shark egg

The egg coating consists of a keratin substance not unlike human hair and nails. The Horn shark egg has a "cork screw" appearance; the Swell shark egg looks quite different. It has spring like tendrils that have two functions, they



help the egg eject from the adult shark and get tangled on objects to anchor it on the sea floor. This prevents the egg from being washed ashore and destroyed.

The cases occasionally wash ashore and have been called "mermaids purses". The beached cases are always empty form either the emergence of the baby shark or predators eating the embryo. Finding a shark or ray egg intact in the ocean is a rare treat. Sometimes they have been successfully hatched in salt-water aquariums. Look for these eggs on Pt. Lobos and Vision trip dives. With a little luck, you may also encounter the adult sharks. Enjoy!

## New Open Water and New Advanced Classes Announced

ainbow Divers has coordinated annual open water classes for gay and lesbian non-divers, who go on to become new members, for a very long time. Club member (and PADI and SSI Instructor) Chuck Buckla taught those classes. Then, in 1998, Chuck suggested having the club organize various advanced classes for its members only. The response was tremendous, and NCRD starting offering classes for everything from Advanced Certification all the way to Divernaster, with Nitrox, Navigation and Photography in between. By the time we suc-

cessfully repeated that cycle of classes in 1999, we had 87 registrants complete upgraded certification level or specialty certification classes. Some individuals signed up repeatedly. Ralph Wolf and I, for instance, went from Open Water certification to Divemaster, taking all the classes with the club. Altogether, ten members became brand new Divemasters over those two years.

Time for the 2000 cycle. Time to spend time having fun with your buddies while upgrading your certification level. Time (again) to be the best diver you can be.

Get out your calendars:

May 6-7 & 13-14: This year's first Open Water class, for

non-divers, and scheduled before Pride Weekend, for the first time. At press time, the class was full.

July 15-16 & 22-23: Open Water class. Limited to 6 non-divers, classes held at Diver Dan's in Santa Clara the first weekend; certifying shore dives in Monterey on the second.

August 5-6: Advanced Certification class. Certifying shore dives on Saturday, certifying deep dives from a boat on Sunday; both in Monterey.

August 26-27 & September 2-3: Open Water class. Limited to 6 non-divers, classes (to be confirmed) at Wallins, in San Carlos on the first weekend; certifying shore dives on the second weekend in Monterey.

September 23-24: Advanced Certification class. Certifying shore dives on Saturday, deep dives off a boat in Monterey on Sunday.

October 14-15: Navigation, Nitrox, Dry Suit classes. Any member may choose one or two specialties to complete over this weekend; Certifying dives in Monterey.

October 28-29: Rescue Diver course begins; followed by the scheduling of a Divernaster course.

To Be Announced: We anticipate more than just two Open Water classes, and they will most likely be scheduled in late September and October, in San Francisco, San Carlos and Santa Clara.

I suggest you encourage your friends who want to learn how to dive, to sign up early. Also explain to them that a good reason to learn to dive with us is they can save money: our classes are offered at a significant discount (the numbers are still being crunched). Another reason is that the normal ratio of


students to teaching staff in almost all commercial open water classes—where profit is the first consideration-is 5 students to every 1 staff member. Our classes reduce that ratio to 2 to 1: the six students will be accompanied in the pool and the ocean by an Instructor and at least two Divernasters. The classes will be taught by, and enrollment will be limited to gays, lesbians, bisexuals, transgender individuals, and their friends. And, the really nifty thing: You'll learn to dive with other students who will all become club members, so you'll have friends to dive with after you certify.

NCRD has had great success with its annual cycle of offering advanced classes for its members. One of the reasons is that

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

# Tight Schedule? Can't plan a dive getaway? Need to practice diving skills? Don't Stop Diving! The NCRD can help with more Monterey shore diving opportunities!!

e're wondering if there is enough member interest to hold a monthly Breakwater Beach Dive - in addition to the monthly Point Lobos Dive. This would give everyone at least two opportunities a month to do day trip shore dives with your NCRD dive buds. We'd try to keep the Point Lobos Beach Dive and the Breakwater Beach Dive at least a couple weeks apart.

We'll have the opportunity to dive various sites depending on group and buddy team interest. Dives like this are perfect for both rusty divers to get active and experienced divers to stay that way. It would also be a great opportunity for some quality social time when we break for lunch somewhere around the Breakwater or take a nice leisurely stroll up Lighthouse or down Cannery Row.

MEETING SPOT: Know that outdoor shower pole at the top of the Breakwater stairs leading to the beach? Let's meet there at 9:00 a.m. to buddy-up and develop dive plans. By 9:15 a.m. we should be suiting-up back

around the cars, so if you're late - look for cool Rainbow Divers.

WEATHER/CONDITIONS: Check the Yahoo weather information for Monterey if you suspect poor weather conditions (e.g., heavy rain, high winds) and the Aquarius Conditions Hot Line (831 657-1020) for dive conditions. A report of visibility at the Breakwater of 10 feet or less will mean that we are canceling the dive. These reports should be checked after 6 p.m. the night before the dive. If things look borderline, call the "Coordinator" listed below the night before.

"COORDINATOR:" We are asking for volunteers to take on a two month commitment to be acting "Coordinator" (this means TWO Saturdays only, one each month). This way, if one of our NCRD buddies shows up alone, she/he will have someone to dive with. A thoughtful phone call or e-mail to the Coordinator from any of those planning to attend would be nice for the Coordinator, so they get a warm and fuzzy feeling that someone might show up to dive with them too. Dean Papoutsis has generously volunteered to act as coordinator for the first iwo Breakwater dives to see if we can get these regular club dives off the ground.


